



**US – CANADA
 ATTESTATION DOCUMENT
 For Export of Organic Crops and Products to Canada**


Under the US-Canada Equivalency Arrangement, organic crops and processed products that are certified to the USDA National Organic Standards, are not required to obtain additional Canadian certification. Under this arrangement, a formal export document is not required to accompany each shipment from the US to Canada. However, written documentation with the below attestation statement is necessary to verify that additional requirements have been met. **These attestations can be made by either the operation or the certifying agent.**

WSDA is providing this Attestation Document to be used by any member of the supply chain for products destined for export to Canada from the US. For any products/ingredients destined for export to Canada from the US that meet the terms of the US-Canada Equivalency Arrangement, complete the information below and provide to Canadian border authorities and/or downstream buyer. This document does not need to be submitted to WSDA.
